FREEHOLDER MEETING
September 17, 2018**

The meeting was called to order by Director Cappelli at 7:00 p.m.

The Clerk called the roll and the following Freeholders answered:

The Director stated that adequate notice of this meeting has been provided in accordance with the Open Public Meetings Act.

The Director asked everyone to rise for the Pledge of Allegiance which was led by American Legion Post #68 and the National Anthem which was sung by Taylor Meachum.

The Director thanked everyone and asked for a round of applause.

Director Cappelli said the County has large print agendas available from the Clerk for the visually impaired.

The Director welcomed everyone to the meeting of the Camden County Board of Freeholders and said we are very pleased to be in the Borough of Merchantville. It is the practice of the Board of Freeholders to hold the meetings each month in one of the municipalities outside of the County Seat of Camden so that all members of the public will have full access to the meetings of the Board.

Director Cappelli asked Mayor Edward Brennan and members of Council to come forward. The Director thanked the Mayor and members of Council for hosting the evening's meeting. He said Merchantville is a small town, a very close knit community and without a lot of resources. This governing body, with the resources that it has, has done a terrific job in helping to maintain the wonderful neighborhoods that are here and to help spur economic development. We are very proud to call the governing body here in Merchantville our partners in government. Mayor Brennan said they appreciate the Freeholder Board holding its meeting here in Merchantville and it is a wonderful opportunity for our public to come here and see our Freeholder Board who we interact with on a regular basis. They help us achieve goals that we have for our local community and the larger broader community. Mayor Brennan introduced Council President Daniel Sperraza, and Council Members Sean Fitzgerald and Griffin Kidd.

PRESENTATION

Director Cappelli said, as we go from town to town and have our meetings, we ask the governing body for the name of a non-profit in town worthy of recognition and a small donation from the Board of Freeholders. The governing body of Merchantville has chosen the Merchantville Little League. The Director asked President Bob Wetherspoon and players to come forward. The Merchantville Little League program serves the youth of Merchantville and its vicinity and provides a healthful activity, training by good leadership and a community focused atmosphere dedicated to helping children become good and decent citizens. The Director finished by saying that through this program, youth learn the spirit of teamwork, sportsmanship and fair play.

COMMUNITY AWARD

Freeholder Moen said he has the honor of presenting the Community Award which is an award recommended by the local Mayor and Council for an organization or individual that they believe is deserving of County recognition. Freeholder Moen asked Matthew Gaskill to come forward. Matthew and his wife, Mary-Elizabeth, became the owners of the former Stephenson Brown Funeral Home in 2016. The funeral home became Gaskill Brown Funeral Home and Cremation Services. The Gaskill family and the funeral home quickly made Merchantville their home. Matt is very involved in the following community organizations: Assistant Coach and Board Member of the Merchantville Little League, Vice President of the Merchantville Task Force, Volunteer Firefighter for the Niagara Fire Department, and President of the Pennsauken-Merchantville Chamber of Commerce. In addition, Matt is a member of the Merchantville Business and Professional Association, the Pennsauken Lions Club, the Woodbine Swim Club and St. Peter's Knights of Columbus. He is also a committee member for the Merchantville Car Show and the Merchantville Farmer's Market. He attends St. Peter Catholic Church and he along with his wife and daughter are active members of Grace Episcopal Church. Professionally, he is affiliated with the following organizations: Burlington County Funeral Directors Association, West Jersey Funeral Directors Association and the NJ State Funeral Directors. Freeholder Moen presented Matthew with a proclamation in honor of his service.

Matt Gaskill said we have only been here less than three years now. We moved to Merchantville as a business decision, but after becoming residents here and operating the business we realized the fringe benefit was the town itself. It was quite easy to become involved. Matt said he was always taught the more you invest in your community, the more you get back in return.

YOUNG COMMUNITY LEADER

Freeholder Young said that as we travel throughout the County from month to month, we like to acknowledge our youth and say thank you for doing a good job with a Young Community Leader Award. He asked Zachary Moore to step forward. Zachary grew up in Merchantville.

He was a member of Boy Scout Troop 119 and always had an interest in the history of his town. His interest recently helped him to achieve the rank of Eagle Scout. He collected personal interviews, vintage photos and video clips for over 6 months and used them to produce a documentary about the lives of the town's influential people both past and present. Zach's project is titled "The Voices of Merchantville". He is currently a Freshman at Temple University, majoring in Theater and Film. Zach now volunteers as a Jr. Assistant Scout Master for Troop 119. The young actor will play Jack in a production of "Into the Woods" at the Ritz Theater in Haddon Township. Zach works as a lifeguard at the Kroc Center in Camden and aspires to one day perform on Broadway.

Zachary thanked the Board and his Scout Master who is a big part of Merchantville and helped him become a young leader for Merchantville. Zachary said he hopes to stay in Merchantville for as long as he can and to help bring its past into the present.

SUSTAINABILITY AWARD

Freeholder Young said each month we celebrate a "sustainable champ" and asked members of the Merchantville Green Team to come forward. The Merchantville Green Team is dedicated to promoting environmental sustainability. The Green Team identifies projects that are happening in town so that the community can be recognized for their work. They identify new projects to further Merchantville's commitment to sustainability. Members are active in other community organizations such as: The Garden Club, Farmers Market, and Backyard Chicken Program. Currently, the Green Team is working on a no-mow habitat along the bike path, community outreach about recycling and pesticides, a Green Team booth at the Farmers Market, a Sustainable Jersey certification, increasing membership to include Haddon Heights High School students and establishing a Junior Green Team at Merchantville School. Freeholder Young said we are proud to recognize the Merchantville Green Team as our Camden County Sustainability Champion for the month of September.

PROCLAMATION

Director Cappelli asked John Donnadio, NJAC Foundation Business Development Director, Addie Colon, from PSEG, Pat Fitzgerald, CCTS Superintendent, and Eva Cetrullo, CCTS Director of School Counseling to come forward. The Director said, each year through NJAC's Foundation, scholarships are given to students in our Technical Schools. He thanked John Donnadio for making the trip down from North Jersey and said John does a great job fighting on behalf of the counties and residents of the State of New Jersey.

The Director said tonight two separate scholarships will be given out. One is funded by PSE&G and the other funded by Investor's Bank. We are very happy tonight to present these scholarships.

The first is the Investor's Bank Scholarship to be presented to Tommy Phouthayong. Tommy is away at college so his parents will be accepting on his behalf. Tommy is a graduate of Camden County Technical School - Pennsauken Campus' Pre-Engineering Program. He was ranked 3rd in his class of 159. At CCTS he was a great leader and member of the National Honor Society, National Technical Honor Society, Future Business Leaders of America and the 21st

Century Program. He was a member of the Boys Volleyball Team and manager of the Girls Volleyball Team. He also participated in the Senior Option Program and took classes at Camden County College in his senior year. He is currently completing his 1st year of college at CCC and plans to attend Rutgers - New Brunswick as an Engineering Major. Tommy would like to explore ways electrical engineering can benefit our sustainable future.

The Director then asked Marc Medina to come forward. Mark is a graduate of Camden County Technical School - Gloucester Township Campus' Music Instrumental Career Program. At CCTS, Marc participated in the Senior Option Program and took classes at Camden County College in his senior year. He is currently completing his 1st year at CCC as a Psychology Major. Marc will pursue a career in Mental Health.

Adie Colon from PSE&G said we participate in scholarship programs and are excited to partner with NJAC. Education is so important to students and she said she is a big supporter of education. She congratulated all the students receiving scholarships this evening.

Director Cappelli said the third student to receive a scholarship tonight is Serene Quick. Serene is at school and could not be here this evening. Accepting on her behalf is her mother, Mrs. Quick. Serene is a graduate of Camden County Technical School - Pennsauken Campus' Accounting and Finance Program where she was one of the top students. At CCTS she was a great leader, volunteer, an award-winning AMP Winter Color Guard and a member of the Marching Band. Serene was a member of the National Honor Society and Future Business Leaders of America and participated in the Senior Option Program. Serene took classes at Camden County College in her senior year and is currently completing her 1st year of college at CCC. Serene was also involved in the Girl Scouts of America and the Creative and Performing Arts. She plans to attend Stockton as a Business major and will pursue a Marketing career.

PROCLAMATION

Freeholder Rodriguez asked Barbara Maronski and John Pellicane to come forward. Freeholder Rodriguez said, as a Freeholder who oversees the Department of Health and Human Services, there is one thing that she has learned and that is the importance of destigmatizing certain issues. There are certain issues that we often see in a very negative light. September 10th to 16th is National Suicide Prevention week. Suicide is one of those issues that we need to destigmatize. Barbara Maronski has been a powerhouse in transforming and changing the way people view what suicide is. Many of us growing up always thought of suicide as something that was a sin. Freeholder Rodriguez said it took people like Barbara Maronski to educate and talk about the issues of mental health, what suicide really is and what the factors are that lead to it, to educate and to teach us how to identify key factors in suicide. Barbara was very instrumental in bringing QPR – Question, Persuade and Response – to Camden County which is a tool kit that can be used by anyone to help us talk to people about issues and identify when a person is in crisis and what to do with that person. She has led the way in launching a County-wide initiative to try to educate people to learn the message of QPR. Suicide is completely preventable but we must accept it as a disease. We must accept that there are factors that can be identified, that can be targeted and that we can see and through that make a change.

Barbara has been building awareness which is essential to preventing the further loss of life. She is the Associate Vice President of Trauma and Violence Prevention Services at Center

for Family Services. She has focused on suicide prevention and other aspects of traumatic loss for over 20 years. Barbara advocates for the implementation and expansion of programs for victims and survivors of trauma and violence. She heads the Traumatic Loss Coalition for Youth in Camden and Gloucester Counties. Barbara was very instrumental in Cure4Camden which looks at violence as a disease. She works closely with the Metro Police, neighborhood associations, and community leaders to lessen crime and increase peace in the city. Barbara's efforts to increase awareness, education, and treatment have greatly impacted the community.

John Pellicane said that Barbara is an unsung hero. She is very modest, not seeking anything beyond trying to do something positive in the community. This is an opportunity to bring some of those folks to light and let people know the work that is going on in the background of the community to continue to help to lower the suicide rate in Camden County.

Barbara thanked the Freeholder Board on behalf of the many groups that she belongs to including the Traumatic Loss Coalition, which is a State-wide initiative and which has a coordinator in every county in the State of New Jersey working to prevent suicide prevention as well as trauma response. She also recognized the Center for Family Services who has given her the opportunity to bring these services in and begin to work with folks. Barbara said suicide is preventable. There is a gentleman by the name of Kevin Hines who is one of the sole survivors of jumping from the Golden Gate Bridge. He said the saddest part of suicide is that it is one of the only diseases where we blame the individual. Barbara said when she shares her stories, they are stories of people she worked with. She shared the story of a young boy who lost his father to suicide. She said they were running a support group and when he came into the group he was as quiet as could be and did not want to talk about it. Twelve weeks later he said he liked the group because he was in a room with people who understood and he was not alone. Another message Barbara shared was from a young man last year who shared with her that one of the things he wanted to get across to people is that when somebody dies of cancer, we say they lost their battle with cancer but when somebody dies of suicide, we hide it. He said his father fought his mental illness but lost his battle.

EMPLOYEE OF THE MONTH

Freeholder Young said this month he has the honor of presenting the Employee of the Month award and asked Al Worthington, of the Camden County Office of Emergency Management to come forward. Al was hired as a Public Safety Telecommunicator with Camden County Department of Public Safety 17 years ago. He has worked in the Office of Emergency Management (OEM) serving as an Emergency Management Planner for 2 years. Some of his responsibilities include disaster preparation of the three shelters in Camden County, coordinating the County's Active Shooter/Hostile Event training and equipment program, and responding to a multitude of emergency incidents and planned events throughout the County. Alvin has a great work ethic and is dedicated to keeping the public safe. Al, his wife and 2 daughters, 11-year-old Avah and 12-year-old Maggie live in Magnolia. He is a life member of Magnolia Fire Company where he is a former Lieutenant and Captain. He was a volunteer firefighter with Magnolia and Chews Landing Fire Departments for 20 years. In his spare time Al enjoys fishing, camping and family outings. Freeholder Young said shared two recent examples of Al's dedication to public safety:

During the Stotesbury Regatta, Alvin was setting up surveillance cameras when he heard Collingswood Police dispatched to a burglary complaint nearby. Alvin observed the suspect based on dispatch descriptions and trailed him while providing dispatch and police with updates resulting in the suspect's apprehension.

The second incident occurred during the XPonential Music Festival at the Camden Waterfront. Alvin was working in OEM's mobile command post when dispatch reported an individual had fallen into the River. Alvin and several other County public safety personnel responded but Al took quick action throwing a rope to the man and securing the rope to the Polaris keeping him safe until Camden Fire Department recovered the man.

Director Cappelli asked for a motion to adopt the First Reading. Freeholder Young made a motion with a second by Deputy Director McDonnell and all Freeholders present voted aye.

PUBLIC HEARING

Bond Ordinance further amending a Bond Ordinance finally adopted January 21, 2016, as amended by a Bond Ordinance finally adopted October 19, 2017 by the County of Camden, State of New Jersey, in order to provide for a change in the improvements authorized by such Ordinance.

Director Cappelli opened the public hearing to anyone who would like to comment on this resolution. Seeing no one wishing to speak, the Director asked for a motion to close the public hearing. Deputy Director McDonnell made a motion, with a second by Freeholder Rodriguez. On roll call, all Freeholders present voted aye.

Director Cappelli then asked for a motion to adopt. Freeholder Young made a motion with a second by Freeholder Rodriguez and all Freeholders present voted aye.

MINUTES

The Director then asked for a motion to accept the minutes of the previous Freeholder Meetings as presented. Freeholder Shin Angulo made a motion with a second by Freeholder Young and on roll call:

COMPTROLLER'S REPORT

The Director asked for a motion to adopt the Comptroller's Report. Freeholder Rodriguez made a motion with a second by Freeholder Shin Angulo and on roll call:

CORRESPONDENCE

The Director asked the Clerk if there was any correspondence. The Clerk responded that yes, there was and proceeded as follows:

“Dear Freeholder Young, I can't thank you enough for your continued support for AWA's mission. Our partnership makes a difference to so many pets and people in our community. I am so proud to be a part of it and I'm appreciative to you and all of the freeholders. Because of you, so many residents in the City of Camden are able to keep their pets healthy through our Vets on Wheels program and our semi-annual Camden Pet Care Days. The residents we meet are so grateful to be able to vaccinate their pets, spay or neuter them, feed them, and more. Seeing their smiles knowing that their pets will be safe makes our hard work so rewarding. Even though this year's Paws and Feet was the wettest I've seen, with your help, we still met our goal. As our biggest fundraiser of the year, meeting that goal means that we can continue to keep our doors open and save lives. I look forward to continuing our partnership and appreciate working together as we strive to enhance the loves of pets – and the people who love them – in Camden County. With Gratitude, Maya Richmond, Executive Director.”

The Director said the next portion of the meeting is open to the public for discussion of resolutions to be acted upon tonight. There will be another public hearing later in the meeting at which members of the public can ask any questions they want regarding the business of Camden County. This portion is limited to the discussion of those resolutions to be acted upon tonight.

The Director opened the public hearing.

Brother Zawdie Abdul-Malik of 3003 Waldorf Avenue in Camden. Mr. Abdul-Malik said he had questions concerning the following Resolutions:

Resolution #3 authorizing an award of Contract, pursuant to solicitation of quotations, by and between the County of Camden (Department of Public Works) and H.A. DeHart & Son, Inc., for the purchase of a snow plow, in the amount of \$11,860.00 and Resolution #4 authorizing an award of Contract, pursuant to solicitation of quotations, by and between the County of Camden (Department of Public Works) and MAC Machine, LLC d/b/a MAC Hydraulics, for the purchase of a snow plow frame, in the amount of \$7,000.00. Mr. Abdul-Malik said I am trying to understand how you can buy a snow plow and then you have to go buy a frame for the snow plow and asked Freeholder Shin Angulo for some understanding on that. Freeholder Shin Angulo said our Director of Department of Public Works, John Wolick, can answer your questions. John said the purchases are for two different vehicles.

Resolution #11 amending Resolution No. 11, adopted December 21, 2017, authorizing a Jurisdictional Agreement, by and between the County of Camden (Department of Public Works) and the New Jersey Department of Transportation, to reflect Federal and Market Streets Feeder Road Improvements, in the amount of \$10,000,000.00. Mr. Abdul-Malik asked if this was for the City of Camden. Freeholder Shin-Angulo replied, yes. By the waterfront? Yes, part of it is. Are they any plans to improve Market and Federal in the community? John Wolick responded that this is a concept study to be performed by the Department of Transportation. When and where will it affect us in our community? I'm not talking about the waterfront where you are spending over \$3 billion dollars. I am talking about in our community. Freeholder Shin Angulo said eventually it will benefit the community and asked Mr. Abdul-Malik to hear her out. She said this a concept study where we are looking at the whole entire aspect, including all the feeder streets that go into Market and Federal Streets.

Resolution #17 authorizing the submission of a Grant Application, by the County of Camden (Department of Public Works) to the Federal Highway Administration, New Jersey Department of Transportation, for Roadway Safety Improvements throughout Camden County, in the amount of \$550,000.00. Freeholder Shin Angulo joked that Mr. Abdul-Malik is on a roll and said that she thinks he likes her. Mr. Abdul-Malik said no, I have questions for all of the others too and that she is nobody special to him. Will these roadway safety improvements include Camden City? The Freeholder responded that this particular grant application does not.

Mr. Abdul-Malik then addressed Freeholder Moen.

Resolution #23 authorizing payment, pursuant to Resolution No. 59, adopted March 17, 2016, to the Camden County Improvement Authority for Project and Construction Management and General Consulting Services, for the 2600 Mt Ephraim Avenue staff parking project in the total amount of \$114,000.00. Is this in Camden? Yes, sir it is in the City of Camden.

Mr. Abdul-Malik then addressed Freeholder Rodriguez:

Resolution #41 authorizing the submission of a Grant Application, by the County of Camden (Department of Health and Human Services) to the State of New Jersey, Department of Human Services, Division of Family Development for the Social Services for Homeless Grant, the Social Services Block Grant, Temporary Assistance for Needy Families Grant and Intensive Case Management Homeless Assistance, in the amount of \$1,096,782.00. Will this include the people in Camden? Freeholder Rodriguez responded, absolutely, it includes all residents equally throughout Camden County. Can a non-profit qualify to apply for some of these funds? Basically, the money goes to the services that the individual needs. These are federal funds that come from the State and the County appropriates them out. Yes, non-profits can apply.

Mr. Abdul-Malik then addressed Freeholder Young:

Resolution #50 urging the Trump Administration, the City of Philadelphia and its surrounding Counties in Pennsylvania to properly award Camden County and South Jersey with its fair share of Urban Area Security Initiative Funding. Will the City of Camden be included in this? Freeholder Young commented that this is a grant from Homeland Security that is given out for the protection of all of the counties that border the Delaware River. What has been happening

is that Pennsylvania has been getting all the money and South Jersey has not received one dime of this money. We are urging them to make sure that we get our fair share of the money. It is for the entire County of Camden. Mr. Abdul-Malik said that is his concern, will Camden City itself be included in that. Freeholder Young said, Camden City is part of Camden County. Mr. Abdul-Malik said he understands that and that he has lived here long enough to know that. He said he is 76 years old and a Veteran of Vietnam. I've lived in Camden over 50 years so I understand that Camden City is the County seat of Camden County. I don't need you to enlighten me on that. Freeholder Young said, you asked me if it included Camden City and I said it included all of Camden County. Mr. Abdul-Malik again asked if it would include Camden City. He said a lot of money has come into Camden County over the years. I worked in the State legislature for 4 years as an aide to a senator so I understand the monies that come in but my thing is, Camden has always been cut short and very rarely gets funded as other areas of "Camden County" gets. That's my concern. Freeholder Young said it is money that go towards public safety. Camden City is a part of Camden County so anything dealing with public safety and has to do with Camden City you are involved. Mr. Abdul-Malik said the future will tell.

Mr. Abdul-Malik then addressed Director Cappelli:

Resolution #66 inserting Chapter 159 Funds into the Budget for the 2018 High Intensity Drug Trafficking Area (HIDTA) Grant, in the amount of \$484,408.00. Is Camden City included in this? Director Cappelli replied, yes.

Resolution #69 authorizing an award of Contract (Bid A-28/2018), by and between the County of Camden (Office of the Prosecutor) and MEDGYN Products, Inc., for four (4) Digital Video Colposcopes, in the amount of \$52,000. Mr. Abdul-Malik said he is somewhat dense and would like to know what a colposcope is. Director Cappelli said it is part of the investigative process in a sexual assault situation.

Resolution #81 authorizing the sale of property located at 25 North 5th Street, in the City of Camden, pursuant to N.J.S.A. 40:37A-77 to the Camden County Improvement Authority. Will this be the Improvement Authority's headquarters? Director Cappelli said that is the property where the Camden County Prosecutor's Office is currently located. Mr. Abdul-Malik said, "I know that". The question is, they have been there for a number of decades and you are saying here that they are buying this building? Director Cappelli said, no. What is going to happen is that the Camden County Prosecutor's Office is moving into the Florio Building. The building is being transferred to the Camden County Improvement Authority and the long-term plan is for Rutgers to develop a building on that site. Mr. Abdul-Malik said so inadvertently it is going to be handed over to Rutgers University? Not handed over, no. It will be sold to Rutgers for development.

Resolution #84 authorizing an award of Contract, pursuant to solicitation of quotations, by and between the County of Camden (Department of Police Services) and SHI International Corp., for the purchase of HDMI cables and splitters, and computer hardware and cables for body worn cameras, in the total amount of \$2,564.48, #85 authorizing an award of Contract, pursuant to solicitation of quotations, by and between the County of Camden (Department of Police Services) and Axon Enterprises, Inc., for the purchase of body worn camera mounts, in the amount of \$2,995.00 and #95 Resolution authorizing an award of Contract (Bid ESCNJ #18/19-03), by

and between the County of Camden (Department of Police Services) and CDW-G, for the purchase of body worn cameras, under the Educational Services Commission of New Jersey Cooperative Pricing System, ID#65-MCESCCPS, in the amount of \$28,346.89 - CAF#9900207925.. All relating to body work cameras. Is this for the entire County police force? Director Cappelli said no, it is for the Metro Police Department. Mr. Abdul-Malik asked, in the City of Camden? Director Cappelli said technically speaking Metro's jurisdiction is throughout the entire County but they do patrol the City of Camden.

James H. Forchion of 261 Elemore Terrace, Cherry Hill. Mr. Forchion said he has a business on Marlton Pike in Camden. At the last meeting for development that took place in Camden, I was also there. Mr. Forchion said he sees in his resolutions that he has a lot of activity going on in Camden already. The only thing that I am concerned about right now is that I have a business on Marlton Pike that has been there since 1972. I have been there consistently since 1972 and every other major artery in the City of Camden has had work done to it except Marlton Pike, except that widening of the intersection at Baird Boulevard. Can we get some kind of renovation, improvement or beautification on Marlton Pike so that we can thrive like the rest of the City? I would like a commitment from you that once we get done what needs to be in place, that you will concentrate some of the monies in that area so that we can develop as a community. Director Cappelli agreed that the road needs a lot of work.

The Director said seeing no other members of the public wishing to comment, he asked for a motion to close the public hearing. Deputy Director McDonnell made the motion with a second by Freeholder Shin Angulo and all Freeholders present voted aye.

The Director closed the public hearing.

The Director said at Caucus this afternoon the Board of Freeholders reviewed all resolutions to be acted upon. It was at that time the Board discussed items to be voted on. We will be voting on resolutions in blocks based on the unanimous consent of the Freeholders.

Director Cappelli opened the meeting to any member of the public who wished to address the Board of Freeholders. The Director declared the hearing open.

PUBLIC COMMENTS

James H. Forchion of 261 Elemore Terrace, Cherry Hill. I know a young lady who is a beautician who also operates a business on Marlton Pike and she is concerned too. Director Cappelli said we are waiting for some of the underground infrastructure to be completed before we can work on the roadway.

Mr. Zawie Abdul-Malik of 3003 Waldorf Avenue, Camden. Mr. Abdul-Malik said I am going to say something that you are not going to like. The officer that was standing back there for quite a while, until I came up front and then he moved up front like I am a criminal of some sort. But I am not. I attended a meeting regarding 27th Street in Camden. There is a plan to improve 27th Street from Federal Street to River Road. We, the citizens of East Camden who live in the area of 27th Street and Marlton Pike, would like to ask all of you to take a ride from 27th

Street to Marlton Pike. It is very cavernous. It has boulders sitting everywhere and no one is taking advantage of it. When you talk to them they say they are going to redo 27th Street from Federal Street to River Road. The roadway is a whole lot better than it is from Federal to Marlton Pike and we are asking that Camden County, one of these days, and I've been living in the same house for over 40 years, you've never done anything on 27th Street in 40 years or more. Director Cappelli said earlier this year we took a tour of parts of Camden City with the current Department of Transportation Commission and we took her down 27th Street. As a result of that tour and the ride that day down 27th Street, we were given a grant to do some work on 27th Street. We know the condition of the road and we will be addressing it as soon as possible. Mr. Abdul-Malik said we asked about it and they said they would redo 27th Street from Federal to River Road. We asked them when are they going to consider doing it from Federal to Marlton Pike and they didn't know. Director Cappelli replied that it was his understanding that it was included. Mr. Abdul-Malik said he went to the meeting and was told from Federal Street to River Road and there was no consideration whatsoever regarding 27th Street from Federal Street to Marlton Pike. Director Cappelli asked who "they" are? Mr. Abdul-Malik replied, the contractor who is putting the plan together. I forgot to bring the name of the company with me today. But the same company that is doing the project told us specifically that Federal Street to River Road would be renewed. Then we spoke to them about the infrastructure on 27th Street, which I understand. I am a former administrator of the City of Camden for over 27 years and I understand all aspects of the project. All I am asking for, as a citizen of the City of Camden all of these years, is that something has to be done in the community to some of these streets. Potholes and things that tear up people's cars, etc. I know you folks have no concern because you don't live here. Maybe I have to go see George Norcross to have you people do a job. Director Cappelli asked Mr. Abdul-Malik if he had anything else to say and Mr. Abdul-Malik said, anything I want to because I am a free man.

Karl Walko, President Local CWA 1014. Last week the media was full of stories about the quotes coming out of the CEO of Holtec and I found them very discouraging and very inappropriate. Local 1014 represents City workers and County workers who live in the City of Camden. My experience has been that in general those individuals are hard workers. They show up, they get the job done and to have someone who received such a benefit from not just the City of Camden, but the State and County of Camden, to say the things that he said that have an impact not just on his company but also are used by other employers as a justification for not hiring people from the City of Camden, I thought was despicable. I know the Mayor of Camden is on the record and calling him out. I wondered if the Freeholders were on the record? Director Cappelli said he cannot speak on behalf of everybody but will have Freeholder Young speak. Freeholder Young said he was with the Mayor at the press conference and I can tell you for a fact that our One Stop has been working with the City residents to make sure they are trained and everyone here at the table tonight is totally appalled by the statements as well. Freeholder Young said he knows for a fact, first-hand in his day job as a union carpenter in the City of Camden, that what he said is wrong. There are very good individuals living and working in Camden. There are some who have had tough breaks and we need to be patient, work with them, train them and skill them to make sure they are ready to go. He said he has been talking about this from the time that these new companies announced they were moving into Camden and have had our One Stop out in front to make sure that people in the City of Camden are prepared to go to work. Mr. Walko said that is

appreciated and when statements are made like this, you need to push back. He said that because he is president and works with these people, he took it personally. In the long run the important thing is that we find jobs for the people in the City of Camden, but in the short run we must call him out on it.

Seeing no other members of the public wishing to comment, Director Cappelli asked for a motion to close the public hearing. Freeholder Young made a motion with a second by Freeholder Shin Angulo and all Freeholders voted aye.

The Director opened the floor to the members of the Board of Freeholders for their comments.

Freeholder Rodriguez said she wanted to highlight a few items from the Camden County Technical School. The CCTS is celebrating 90 years of careers. She said she is very proud. She also commented that we have parents' night on October 3rd from 6:30 – 9:00, with October 4th being the raindate and a yard sale on October 13th from 8 AM to 1 PM. Freeholder Rodriguez said she is very proud of the school and everything that they do. Last year we sent 80 kids to the Senior Option Program which means that most of them actually completed their first year of college education while still in high school.

Freeholder Young thanked the Mayor and Council for hosting the evening's meeting. He thanked all of his departments for all of the hard work they do. Freeholder Young said he would like to send prayers to the residents of North and South Carolina.

Freeholder Shin Angulo said there is a lot of construction going on throughout our County and roads are being repaved. Please take your time and give yourself extra time to get where you are going.

Freeholder Moen thanked the Mayor and Council for hosting the meeting, and especially the members of the American League Post #68. Friday, September 21st is National POW/MIA Awareness Day so please keep that in mind and think of all of those who sacrificed everything for their Country. He also congratulated the honorees tonight, as well as the new member and reappointed members of the Construction Appeals Board. Finally, Freeholder Moen recognized the Camden County employees who did a tremendous job in working to put together another year of the September 11th Travis Mannion Run at Cooper River Park. Although it rained throughout the entire 5K run, we still had a few 100 runners who participated, as well as had former Secretary of the Army, Congressman Patrick Murphy from Pennsylvania who ran the race. Afterwards, he commended Camden County for our partnership with the Travis Mannion Foundation which raises money for survivors for September 11th attacks and their families.

Freeholder Deputy Director McDonnell thanked the Mayor and Council for hosting this evening's meeting, as well as the American Legion for being here and leading us in the ceremonies and all our employees for all the great work they do every day.

Director Cappelli reminded everyone that on Sunday, September 23rd from 1:00 – 4:00 the Board of Freeholders, together with every town across America, Mother's Demand Action and Students Demand Action will be holding a Concert Across American to end Gun Violence at

Wiggins Park in Camden. The Director thanked the employees of Camden County for their hard work that they do day in and day out on behalf of our residents.

The Director asked for a motion to adjourn. Freeholder Young made a motion with a second by Freeholder Shin Angulo and all Freeholders voted aye.

The meeting was adjourned at 8:00 p.m.
