BOARD OF CHOSEN FREEHOLDERS MEETING
JANUARY 20, 2011 - 7:00 P.M.

The meeting was called to order by Director Louis Cappelli, Jr. at 7:00 p.m. The Director asked the Clerk to call the roll and the following Freeholders answered to their name:

Director Cappelli stated that adequate notice of this meeting has been provided in accordance with the Open Public Meetings Act.

Director Cappelli asked everyone to stand for the Pledge of Allegiance which was led by Sterling High School ROTC. The National Anthem was performed by Annie Locke and Allison Korn, members of Sterling High School Silvertones.

Director thanked Annie Locke and Allison Korn and the Sterling High School ROTC for their participation.

Director Cappelli announced that if requested, the County has large print agendas for the visually impaired. He said if you require large print, please see the Clerk.

Director Cappelli welcomed everyone. He said it is an honor to be in Somerdale tonight. He said it is the practice of the Board of Freeholders to hold our meeting each month in one of our municipalities outside the County seat of Camden so that all members of the public will have full access to the meetings of the Board.

PRESENTATION

The Director said as is our custom I would like to ask Mayor Gary J. Passanante and members of Council to come forward. Director Cappelli said I speak on behalf of all of the Freeholders when I say that the governing body behind me right now from the Borough of Somerdale is one of the most progressive leading governing bodies, not only in Camden County but also in the State of New Jersey. The Director said Mayor Passanante has taken on a role much beyond the Mayor here in Somerdale and provides leadership for Mayors throughout the State of New Jersey. Together, the Mayor and the members of Council, this year have completed a tremendous redevelopment project at the shopping center on the White Horse Pike. He said a project that began 10 years ago under the principles of Smart Growth and they took a shopping center that was failing miserably, was basically vacant and they redeveloped it into a very vibrant retail community, adding a housing element and it is really one of the premier redevelopments in the State of New Jersey. The Director said, Mayor and Council, I commend you and congratulate you for that effort.

Director Cappelli said we come bearing a gift. He called upon Freeholder Rodriguez to come forward. Freeholder Rodriguez presented Mayor and Council with the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) check in the amount of \$31,766.00 for the residents of Somerdale.

Mayor Passanante said, welcome everyone to our lovely town of Somerdale at Sterling High School, my high school where I graduated many years ago and it certainly is a privilege and honor to be here tonight to share in this meeting with our Freeholders who have been very supportive of our community and doing a great job throughout the County. The Mayor then introduced the Council members who were present: Councilman George Ehrmann, Councilwoman Carol Jenkins-Mitchell, Councilwoman Jennifer McQuaid. He thanked everyone for coming out and thanked the Freeholders for coming to our community and sharing what they are doing throughout the community with Somerdale. Thank you again.

GIFT DONATION

Director Cappelli said as we go from community to community we ask the governing body for the name of a non-profit in town deserving of recognition and a small donation from the Board of Freeholders. The Governing Body of Somerdale has chosen Chemo Clothes to be recognized tonight. The Director called upon the founder, Jared Levy to come forward.

Director Cappelli said a little bit about Chemo Clothes. This organization was founded in honor of Jared's Mother, Deb Levy, who passed away due to breast cancer. While she was undergoing treatment, she loved to knit scarves. Jared saw her knitting as an opportunity to help the cancer community in a couple of ways. He encourages chemo patients to knit, crochet, sew or other craft and give them a charitable outlet for their creative work. As the patients perform their work and produce products, they are sold and the proceeds from the sale of the products are donated to cancer-related non-profit organizations. He also hosts some special events and fundraisers. He said Jared took which was really a tragic situation for his personal life and has made the best of it and is now raising funds to help others who are the victims of cancer. Director Cappelli said, Jared, on behalf of the Board of Freeholders, please accept this small token of appreciation and our gift for your organization.

Jared Levy thanked the Freeholders.

COMMUNITY AWARD

Freeholder Greco welcomed everyone. Freeholder Greco said it is my pleasure to give out the Community Award this evening. He called upon Tony Santora and John Betz to come forward. Freeholder Greco said these gentlemen are proprietors of a new store here in Somerdale, New Jersey, known as Swiss Farms. He said the community wanted to acknowledge their contributions. They took on donating, getting involved in the community before they moved into Somerdale. They actually had a fun run that supported Chemo Clothes and were at Somerdale Day. It is my pleasure to present this Proclamation. The Freeholder then read the Proclamation. He said Swiss Farms established a mutual beneficial relationship with Somerdale before opening and they only recently opened its doors in Somerdale but has already distinguished itself as a friend and a supporter of the residents of the town. It has become an important component in the Somerdale community. He said this is the first store in the State of New Jersey that is a Drive-Thru Convenience Store.

Freeholder Greco then presented them with the Proclamation and congratulated them.

CONDOLENCE

Freeholder Nash welcomed everyone and said we are going to have many special people we are going to recognize this evening. Before we do that, he said it is important that we take a moment of reflection and remember a person who had been very giving of himself, along with his family, to our community. Freeholder Nash called upon the family and friends of Nick Laurito to come forward. Freeholder Nash said we are going to share the stage with you because you shared Nick with us for so many years. A person we fondly remember as, if there ever was a Mr. Camden County, it would be Nick Laurito! Freeholder Nash said Nick was Camden County. Unfortunately, Nick passed away last month and we wanted to express our appreciation on behalf of the Board but also on behalf of all the residents of this County by way of a Condolence Resolution. Freeholder Nash read the Resolution. Mr. Laurito passed away on December 13, 2010 at the age of 66. He was the father of three children and grandfather to two. He is preceded in death by his wife, Sis, ten years. He worked for Camden County for 31 years. He retired in 2005 as Acting Director of the Parks Department. He started with the County as a Personnel Assistant to the Camden County Hospital in 1974. In 1977, he transferred to the Parks Department where he spent the next 28 years of his career. He oversaw a lot of projects including Newton Lake Dredging, the construction of indoor restrooms at Cooper River and "Rob a Riverbank" clean-up program. Traveling was one of Mr. Laurito's joys, which led him to organize the Haddon Township Travel Club. He was an active member of Holy Savior Church in Westmont and of the Sons of Italy. He loved cooking, politics and above all, his family! His energy was contagious. Freeholder Nash said he was so well loved throughout the County. Freeholder Nash said we wanted to express our condolences and sympathies. He said we will miss Nick and will always have him in our hearts.

EMPLOYEE OF THE MONTH

Director Cappelli called upon Michael Brennan, Jr. and his parents, Jean and Michael Brennan to come forward. The Director also asked Roland Traynor to come forward as well. The Director said it is the practice of the Board of Freeholders to recognize one of our employees every month. It was my turn to choose this month and I chose from the Division of Special Events, Michael Brennan, Jr. He said since Michael joined the County, he has served as an Aide at the Division of Special Events and day in and day out shows up for work; does a great job, volunteers for any task that is out there and just overcomes challenges everyday to make Camden County a better place for the residents of Camden County. He is loved and adored by everybody who works with him and quickly became the most popular person at Division of Special Events. He lights up a room - the apple doesn't fall far from the tree - his mother and father, Michael and Jean are with us as well. They are loving parents, great individuals and they should be very proud of their son, Michael, who does a great job on behalf of the residents of Camden County everyday. Congratulations!

Roland Traynor said on behalf of the whole staff, we want to congratulate Mike. I can tell you as a Division, it is no secret and we do appreciate the fact that we deal everyday with a pretty good product. It's popular; it's appreciated by the public. One of the obligations that we have is to get the word out and we do that by all different means but there is a thirst for information that comes with these events and there is one phone number listed that they call and that phone rings right

on Mike's desk. Mike is the guy everyday that deals with "Is there an opening act? - What about the rain? Should I bring an umbrella - what time does it start? It says here the movie starts at dusk - when is dusk - what is dusk? Nobody knows! Mike handles that everyday; he is very attentive and he is very supportive and he represents the County well and we are all very proud of you. It is well deserved! Thanks, Mike.

The Director then presented Michael with a clock and a Savings Bond. The Director said, Mike, on behalf of the Board of Freeholders and the residents of Camden County, thank you for all you do on behalf of our residents.

SPECIAL PRESENTATIONS

Director Cappelli then asked Michael Brennan, Sr. to come back up. Director Cappelli said tonight is bitter sweet for the Board of Freeholders because we have two individuals leaving the County - one Michael Brennan and Freeholder Riletta Cream. Director Cappelli said Mike has served as County Counsel for three years. He has brought a level of professionalism to the County that is really unprecedented. He is very smart as well. Each of the previous County Counsels, the last four or five, have become Superior Court Judges. Michael is smart enough not to take that route. His insight his sensitivity to people, his knowledge of the Law and his leadership have been a tremendous asset to the Board of Freeholders. On a personal note, having grown up in Collingswood where Michael was Mayor for 20 years, I have known him for decades. He has done so much for the Borough of Collingswood - he bleeds "Blue & Gold" for Collingswood everyday, no matter where he is. He is a tremendous public servant. The Director said you will be sorely missed by the Board of Freeholders. Thank you for your service.

Director Cappelli then called upon Freeholder Riletta Cream to come forward. He said Freeholder Cream announced this week that she will be retiring from the Board of Freeholders at the end of this month, January 31st.

Director Cappelli said Freeholder Cream has been serving on this Board since 1994. She has been a trail blazer on this Board but also has been a trail blazer in education in Camden County and specifically in Camden City, her entire life. She has dedicated her life to helping the youth of Camden City and Camden County and to helping those most in need. When I first ran for the Board, my running mate was Riletta Cream and that is when I really first got to know her. I can tell you, everywhere we went and still everywhere we go, there is never a time where a former student doesn't come forward, saying Ms. Cream I was in Camden High such and such a year, you served as my inspiration, you were the greatest role model I had in my life. Because of you, I now have a special career. She has touched the lives, literally, of thousands of people. Since she has been with the Board, I can tell you she has touched the life of every member of this Freeholder Board. Riletta Cream has been the conscience and the class of this Freeholder Board. She constantly reminds us that we are here to serve those most in need. She constantly reminds us that the youth of Camden County needs special attention. We need to pay focus and pay attention to their needs. She constantly reminds us why we are here. I think that is most of what we will miss about her. Her love for humanity, her dedication to the residents of Camden County and her leadership are really invaluable for this Board. Ms. Cream, we will miss you. We have several gifts for you

before you sit down. Director Cappelli said on behalf of the Freeholders, I would like to say, we love you very much, please don't forget us and thank you for your service! The Director then presented Freeholder Cream with a bouquet of flowers and a travel bag filled with gifts. These are a small token of appreciation for all that you have given us. He said I think you will use that travel bag!

Freeholder Cream thanked the Director and said they were wonderful and inspiring remarks. Freeholder Cream said I haven't cried yet but you almost made me start! Freeholder Cream said as most of you know, I have been with the Freeholder Board for 16 years. I want to thank all of you who sit out in front of me who are residents of Camden County for electing me over five times to serve the people in the State of New Jersey and in Camden County. As our Director has mentioned, I was Principal of Camden High School for 15 years and retired after having served there for 15 years. I just seemingly couldn't go home and do nothing and I challenge all of you who might be near retirement age - don't stop working if your health is good. When you stop and do nothing, it seems as though your body will just start to fall apart. When it gets to the point, as I said my goodbyes to the Freeholders at Caucus, you can dye your eyebrows and you can dye your hair a different color but you can't do your eyelashes! When the gray starts to show in that and your knees start to bend a little bit, it's time to go home and give another person the opportunity to serve as a member of this wonderful Freeholder Board. Freeholder Cream said I have enjoyed it. Had I not enjoyed it, I would have left a long time ago because as you know, after having been a Principal and a Teacher, you do get a pension and you do get Social Security so you can stay home. Being a Freeholder, will never make you rich! Being a Freeholder means that you too want to serve people; you work because you care for people. That's what all these wonderful people in back of me do every single day. They work to serve the needs of this County because they love the constituents. I have been very fortunate to be the liaison to Camden County College, the liaison to the Libraries, the liaison to the Vocational Schools - all things that I love about education. I want to thank my Directors. I have had two of them. Jeff Nash for ten years and Lou Cappelli for six years! Both of them have served this County well and I want all of the members of the Freeholder Board, Ross Angilella; our wonderful great attorney who keeps all of us safe, Mike; Linda and Marianne for doing such a great job. I want to thank you for always being there. Ross Angilella, the one who stays until 7:00/8:00 p.m. at night trying to do the things that are right for this County. I thank you because I know how diligently all of you work. You have other jobs, I think I was the only one retired that could stay home. The rest of you had other jobs. That means a lot. Before closing, I would like Stephanie Fisher to step up here. Those of you who have secretaries and aides and people working for you know, we get all the credit, but the people who really do the leg work, the hard work, she is not only my Aide, she has been with me for many, many years and she is the reason why I am able to come at night, because when you get older your eyes start to fail you and you can't see as well as you did when you were sixteen. She is always readily available to take me anywhere that I have to go. She too has served this County well and for me, she has not only been my Aide, she is like my daughter. I want to personally thank her tonight for having served me well and I do appreciate you understanding my little idiosyncrasies and my little things that I have that sometimes are not too good! I thank you very much. Freeholder Director Cappelli again thank you very much!

PROCLAMATION

Deputy Freeholder Director welcomed everyone. Deputy Director McDonnell said I am going to ask some very special people to come up. He called upon President of PBA Local 351, Rob Parker to come forward, along with Ron Burge of the South Jersey Centurions Motor Cycle Club and Timothy Downing, one of our Corrections Officers, who is also a member of the South Jersey Centurions Motor Cycle Club to come forward. He also called up Robert Egan, Corrections Officer, Peter Farlow, Denita Forest, Corrections Officer, Lance McCarthy, Corrections Officer, John Ryser, who is a Corrections Officer and a member of the Centurions Motor Cycle Club and John Straub to come forward as well.

The Deputy Freeholder Director said we asked these folks to come up here tonight because we want to ask you to please recognize them for some great work that they have done without recognition for the last couple of years and the last time was December 9th. They come to a school for very severely disabled children and these are the only folks who can make it this evening, there are actually fifteen of them, who came to Larc School, a school for severely and moderately disabled children in Bellmawr. They brought K-9 Units, a firetruck; the Centurion Motor Cycle Club led them in and the best part, was someone played Santa. He said they made these children so happy - not only by being able to look at the equipment and play with the lights but be able to most especially see Santa Claus. They brought so many beautiful, wonderful and thoughtful gifts, not just stuff they picked up somewhere - stuff they thought about appropriate gifts for the kids. The Deputy Director said the guy who led all that is Rob Parker who is the President of PBA. He said I know you had a lot of help and I don't want to take away anybody else's credit. Rob did the lead on this and these men and women have been so supportive of Larc School - not only do they come and do this Christmas thing every year. You cannot believe the thrill that it is for the children, who so desperately need that kind of attention and it is so much appreciated. The other thing they do is they participate and support the Bridge Run which is run for Larc School every year. The Deputy Director said to Rob Parker that he understands Rob is getting himself into peak condition to run in the Bridge Run next year. It is only 6.2 miles and I don't think you'll have any trouble. Another thing Rob probably wouldn't want me to tell you, but for any of his buddies who are Corrections Officers who want to participate in the Ben Franklin Bridge Challenge for Larc School, he pays their registration fee so that all can be in it. Rob, that is wonderful stuff. The Deputy Director said I have a Proclamation here that I want to present - it talks about all the great things these guys did. I won't go on and on with it but I've kind of described the kinds of stuff that PBA 351 has done for Larc School. He said the best part, the Larc School is an important haven for children as young as three years old and up to adulthood with moderate and severe disabilities where teachers focus on their goals and try to give their lives all that they possibly can and that Larc School depends on generous support of caring individuals and because of all of that we are honoring PBA 351, Rob Parker and all of his men and women who work with him. He said the best part is that we are honoring them for bringing such joy to the hearts of these children. The Deputy Director said thank you for all the wonderful work

you do.

Mr. Parker said I am honored to accept this award on behalf of the professional Corrections Officers of PBA 351. It is not about us, it's about the children. I am very proud of how my members conduct themselves and their willingness to give their own time to help these children along with the various events that we do throughout the year. I want to thank the Freeholder Board, especially Freeholder McDonnell and I also want to wish Freeholder Cream best of luck in your retirement. I hear that Freeholder Greco is doing the run with me as well!

PROCLAMATION

Freeholder Rodriguez called upon Patricia Egan Jones to come forward for the next presentation. Freeholder Rodriguez said as many of you may know, we were recently elected and one of the most exciting, tedious and very eventful things that we often do when we are running is knock on doors. When we came to Somerdale to knock on doors, we didn't get very far. There was one door that we knocked on and we just were drawn to this one door and the people that lived in there. They were very exciting people. Sometimes you see some interesting things that are good and sometimes you see some interesting things that are not so good - this door was just absolutely captivating. Tonight, I would like to honor a young man whose name is Michael Gilchrist and she asked Michael and his Mother to come forward. Freeholder Rodriguez said I am sure many of you know of Michael. When we walked through the door and we saw this very tall, handsome young man, we said "you must play basketball"! Low and behold we didn't just have a basketball player but a basketball superstar. Michael is a Somerdale resident who recently signed a Letter of Intent with Kentucky University for basketball. He has dedicated himself to the sport making tremendous sacrifices and always striving to improve himself. His hard work has paid off. Freeholder Rodriguez noted that Michael is rated by ESPN as the Number 1 small forward and Number 3 overall player in the Country. He also helped the U.S. under 17 Team win gold at the National Teen World Championship in Germany. He dedicated his career to his father who died when he was only two years old. When his Uncle recently passed, Michael wanted to honor him as well and is looking into changing his name to include his Uncle's. His Mother, Cynthia Richardson, describes him as a gentle spirit and a very humble individual. The Freeholder said young men of Michael's focus and determination are rare and should be applauded. Freeholder Rodriguez said Michael has been recognized by National Magazines; has been on TV and has been in many other places. Freeholder Rodriguez said on behalf of the Board of Chosen Freeholders of Camden County, we would like to give you this small token of appreciation for the tremendous talent that you have and that you continue to share. Not only is Michael very talented, she said, but he is a very giving soul. She said his Mother plays a huge part in that. The Freeholder said one of the other reasons why we stayed at this door was because we were talking to Mom. While we were talking to Mom, of course, the topic of conversation was Michael but we also discovered an incredible, empowering woman. The Freeholder said Cynthia, is a woman of determination, a woman who gave up everything and stood by her son to make sure that his talent, his gifts could be fed and could flourish and could be present for all of us to enjoy. She said Michael travels 80 miles a day to go to school. Michael, as his Mother shared with us, does have a learning disability but he is not only finishing high school at an early age, he is taking AP courses

and excelling! She said this is a man who knows how to overcome obstacles and this is a lady that stands behind him. Freeholder Rodriguez and Surrogate Pat Jones presented Mrs. Richardson with a bouquet of flowers.

Surrogate Pat Jones said you can read about this young man in a lot of ESPN magazines. He does great honor on all of us. His Mother is incredible. Behind every great man is a great woman!

Michael said I don't have a speech prepared. I want to thank my Father, my Sister and my wonderful Grandmother. It is just a blessing that is all I want to say.

Mrs. Richardson said I want to say to Freeholder Cream, you were my Principal from 1981 to 1982 and 1982 to 1983. She said Michael's birth father was on Camden High's Basketball team - and they went undefeated in 1984. Mrs. Richardson said her family moved us to Somerdale in 1983. She said 1983 was a pivotal year for my family and me. When Michael's father passed away, I was blessed to have a new husband, Vincent, and a step-daughter, who graduated from Sterling High School in 2004. She said she herself graduated from Sterling in 1985. She said she decided that this was the community where I wanted to raise my children. Not only did I come from a strong family and a strong woman, but Ms. Cream when we went to school at Camden High School we couldn't escape our parents. To Ms. Cream, she said you taught us the old school morals and values in school that our parents taught us at home. It is what our community is missing right now! She said I say that to say that we honor Michael and I thank the Camden County Board of Chosen Freeholders for recognizing my 17 year old, however, Michael is going to be an example for children to come. We are not a lost community - all we have to do is sacrifice ourselves and our lives for our children. Recognize the gifts that we see in our young people - praise our young people and move forward. What we do right now and I thank the Board of Freeholders for giving me the stage and I thank Carmen Rodriguez and Pat Jones for giving an hour and forty minutes the day you came to our door. We have to learn to do something different to step outside of ourselves. I know this is not my stage but I'm going to use it. We have to do something different for our young people. Our young people are our future. When we pick up the paper everyday, we read negative, after negative after negative! She said it is not all negative. We have to look at the positive in ourselves and transpire that into our young people. Hence, you have Michael Gilchrist. Michael is the product of a village; of people who have sacrificed not only for themselves but for him in his success. He is the end result of sacrifice and that is it. Thank you.

Pat Jones said for all of you that have never run for public office. You cannot imagine the joy in running for office in a County like Camden with extraordinary diversity in our communities and when you get to meet some extraordinary people, you really hadn't noticed how we missed Michael and his Mom, I don't know. You heard from her and you can tell what an extraordinary woman that she is and why we were there for an hour and forty minutes. It was easy to see and she is an inspiration, a very important inspiration and she is mentoring other folks too. Michael isn't the only success story.

Ms. Jones said I want to key off what Mrs. Richardson said. This woman (Riletta Cream) that is retiring tonight is an extraordinary woman. She said I could not come here for her

last Freeholder meeting and not say anything. To applaud her and to wish I could more closely walk in her footsteps. You know it is in our life that we find people that we pattern ourselves off a bit and Riletta Cream has been an inspiration to many. I first heard about her through State Senator Walter Rand, who was very thrilled with her. He was very active in Camden Board of Education issues and knew what a value she was as an educator. He always wanted Riletta Cream to be in public service not that education isn't public service. It certainly is. He would have been overjoyed to see her longevity and her leadership. I just really always wished I could be the lady Riletta Cream is - God bless you, Riletta!

The Director then continued with the agenda.

MINUTES

Director Cappelli said the next order of business is the Minutes of our previous meeting and asked for a motion to accept the Minutes as presented. Deputy Director McDonnell made a motion to adopt the Minutes with a second by Freeholder Leonard and on roll call:

CORRESPONDENCE

Director Cappelli then asked the Clerk of the Board if there was any correspondence. The Clerk answered that there was no correspondence.

COMPTROLLER

It is noted for the record, there is no Comptroller's Report.

Director Cappelli announced that the next portion of this meeting is open to the public for discussion on the Resolutions that the Freeholders are going to be acting upon this evening. He said there will be another public session after the meeting, at which time the public can ask any questions they want regarding the business of the County. Director Cappelli said that this particular portion of the public hearing is to be limited to discussion of those Resolutions that the Freeholders are going to be voting on tonight.

Director Cappelli then declared the public hearing open.

Rob Nixon, Director of Government Affairs for the New Jersey State PBA, addressed the Freeholders. Mr. Nixon said I would like to comment very briefly on the Resolution to study the consolidation of Police Departments in the County. First, I think that you are well aware and your Resolution says it that Local governments, County governments throughout the State are facing significant financial crisis. The two percent cap that is being imposed starting this year is going to lead, in our opinion, to the lay-off of hundreds if not thousands of Law Enforcement Officers throughout the State. I think that it is not just in the Camdens, in the Newarks, the Trentons or Atlantic City's of the world but in local governments of all shapes and sizes. Mr. Nixon said when we saw the Press Release that came out last week certainly there was a significant amount of concern initially to the concept. But, through the communication that I think that we have developed over the

years, myself, Freeholder Leonard, who I have known for many, many years and many of you, we have been able to get some of those questions resolved as to the ultimate direction. He said ultimately, the question of police services at any level of government rests with the people. It is government's primary obligation to consider the public safety. It is the one thing that government has to do! He said I know that doing this without doing a study certainly would be reckless. Having a review of what is possible and making sure that the stakeholders are at the table, which Freeholder Leonard has given me his word is going to take place, I think that is a place where we could certainly be part of that discussion. Is it of great concern, of course it is because nobody really knows what it would take right now to manage a County this size with its various needs. He said if you put yourself in the position of a Law Enforcement Officer who might be subject to losing their job now, the idea of this certainly is extraordinarily scary and if you look at what just happened in Lakewood last week, you don't have to be in an urban area to face risk of life and peril as a Law Enforcement Officer. Mr. Nixon said we would appreciate continued discussion. He said I think you know having dealt with the State PBA that you know that we are an honest broker. We will come to the table with criticisms, concerns and with objective comments but I would encourage you as you have done in the past to continue that relationship with us. I think you know from having heard from your constituents in the County that the Press Release itself sent a shutter through the Law Enforcement Community. I think that we would encourage the communication and continue. He said I am not saying that we will be in a position to fully support regionalization in one place but in other places it might make sense. It might be good for those Officers but that will be up to the people, to those Officers and to their local elected officials. Mr. Nixon said I think you know that we are here as a resource, I will give you an honest opinion as it comes along and look forward to sitting down and I trust that you will continue to keep us in the loop as we move forward.

Director Cappelli thanked Mr. Nixon for his comments. He said we are all on the same page. We all recognize the dire financial situation that is out there and the fact that this two percent cap as it affects Camden County affects every municipality, some more than others. The Director said some police officers, public safety employees have already been laid off - many more will be this year. We just want to act as a facilitator. He said we actually sent out an invitation to all the union leaders, the FOP, and fire to have a meeting in the beginning of February to have discussion. The Director said the sole purpose of our Press Release was to do just that - to begin discussions. He said we certainly are not experts in law enforcement, we don't know how to form a Police Department. He said we don't even know if every Mayor wants to be a part of a regional/County Police Department but it certainly is worth discussing because if we let things go the way they are, there truly could be sometime in the near future a public safety crisis in Camden County and New Jersey because of the lay-offs. The Director said I think we just all need to look at these issues, financial issues, and public safety issues and together come up with a resolution. The Director said we can't do without the input of your organization, the Mayor's organization or the fire organizations. Let's just begin discussions and see where it goes. Hopefully, he said, we can provide together a solution.

Mr. Nixon said our concern is that we are facing a Law Enforcement crisis as we speak, it is developing. Mr. Nixon

said for what it's worth, we testified against the two percent cap but argued not just to not have it but to have a Public Safety exemption to it because we knew that this was coming and you're going to see the crime spike in all sorts of levels and it doesn't have to be in the urban areas, it's going to be across the board and hopefully, the folks in Trenton will recognize that you can't balance the books on the backs of public safety because at some point in time, you're going to need to call somebody and there is not going to be somebody at the end of the line. Mr. Nixon said I appreciate those comments and I think you know that you can always communicate with us and that is what we would ask at the early stages that you continue to do so. Thank you.

There being no one else wishing to speak, the Director asked for a motion to close the public portion. Deputy Freeholder Director McDonnell made a motion to close the public portion with a second by Freeholder Leonard and on roll call, all Freeholders present voted aye.

Director Cappelli said that at our Caucus on Tuesday evening, the Board of Freeholders reviewed the resolutions to be acted upon tonight. He said it was at that time that the Board discussed items to be voted on and we will be voting on resolutions in blocks based on unanimous consent of the Freeholders.

Rob Nixon addressed the Freeholders once again. Mr. Nixon said I couldn't come here this evening without saying something in honor of Michael Brennan. He said Mike Brennan is a decent, hard-working public servant. He said you deserve the accolades that they gave you tonight. In all the time I have worked with you, when you shook my hand and looked me in the eye, I knew that you were honest, truthful, you keep your word. You are an example of what public service should be. It is an honor to work with you and I wish you all the best in the future. He said I know we are going to follow up when you are finished up there. Best wishes to you and I really do appreciate all your hard work in our relationship in the past. Good luck.

Director Cappelli said Michael serves on the Board of Trustees of Knights Park, which is across the street from his house and one of Mike's favorite places to be and look at is Knights Park and he cares a lot about the Park. The Director said one of his gifts that we gave him tonight was a donation for a Park Bench in Knights Park across the street from his house. So, if you want to catch up with Mike, I guarantee you, he will be sitting on that bench with a cigar. Mr. Nixon said I will be there to join him then!

Seeing no one else from the public wishing to speak, Director Cappelli asked for a motion to close the public portion. Deputy Freeholder Director McDonnell made a motion to close the public portion with a second by Freeholder Greco and all Freeholders present voted aye.

The Director then opened the floor to the members of the Board of Freeholders for their comments.

Freeholder Cream thanked the Mayor and members of Council for their hospitality in permitting us to come to this lovely High School. We thank you and wish all of you the best.

Freeholder Nash said I want to dedicate these comments to two friends who will be stepping away from this Freeholder Board. First, to our Counsel, Mike Brennan, for those of you who have served in public office or have been involved in the community, you know that there are people who work tirelessly behind the scenes that serve as the foundation by which you operate in public life. Mike Brennan is one of those people, he said. Freeholder Nash said I have known Mike since I began my public service, over twenty years ago. I cannot think of another person through the years who has been a model of intelligence, and dedication to residents and community other than Mike Brennan. It is almost an impossible task to go from private sector to then public sector to leave a law office for the most litigious County in the entire Country. Mike Brennan has done it seamlessly. I consider him a close friend, a great colleague, but most importantly, a great community leader. For that Mike, I want to thank you and wish you well in your retirement from this Board.

To Riletta Cream, Freeholder Nash said I am the only person who has served longer on this Board than Riletta and when she said tonight that she has been on this Board for sixteen years that is almost impossible for me to believe. It seems like it was just yesterday, Riletta, that you joined the Freeholder Board and sixteen years later, you are stepping away. You seem

as vibrant, as beautiful and as tenacious as you did sixteen years ago. You said it is time to leave when your knees bend and your hair color changes - my knees have bent for a long time and I don't know if I can change my hair color! The Freeholder said when I was trying to define Riletta Cream, if you had to pear it down to a single word, I would have to say Riletta Cream has been an inspiration. He said I remember when she first came on to the Freeholder Board and we were walking through Camden City to the Townhouses and this man, he must have been about 35 years old, was sitting on his porch smoking a cigarette, having a beer on a hot summer night and he saw Ms. Cream approaching and quickly hid the cigarette and his beer. That is the type of respect that she commands from those High School days. She said to him you don't have to that any more. He said, "No, Ms. Cream, that's what I have to do when I saw you coming". Freeholder Nash said that is the kind of respect that she has commanded but through her sixteen years, the two things that really stand out; this is really her legacy on this Freeholder Board, among so many of her other legacies - the Camden County Library System and the Camden County College. Under her direction, Camden County College has expanded its Blackwood Campus; it is now recognized as the top Community College in the entire State of New Jersey and one of the top in the Country. Under Riletta's leadership, he said it expanded to Camden City because she wanted to make sure that the students of Camden had the same opportunity as the suburban students. He said she built the campus in Cherry Hill. Under her leadership, the Library System has expanded - new libraries in Bellmawr, in Winslow and, of course, her pride and joy the library in Camden City. Freeholder Nash said, Riletta, you have been an inspiration not only to me but to the people who you have worked with over sixteen years and prior to that, you are a very special person. You will always be a very special person in my life - you have meant the world to me and I am going to deeply miss you. Thank you for your service.

Freeholder Leonard said Mike Brennan is truly the glue that keeps this Board together. His leadership is second to none; his guidance will be sorely missed here. Freeholder Leonard said a lot of times when we have trying times on this Board, Mike is always there. He would say, well it's terrible news but I'll make it somewhat bad news! Mike is always known for his wit and his humor. He has been a true friend to me since I've come on this Board and has always tried to mentor me and I've always appreciated that. I want to thank you for that, Mike. Freeholder Leonard said Mike has always been hardworking and honest and he has been a dedicated individual. He said usually when you're fighting it out, Mike is there with you. He is always there to say, listen this is going to be tough but we will get through this. He said as Rob Nixon said from the PBA, those were trying times when we were working on those issues but Mike was still there saying, look, let's sit at the table and work things out the right way. Mike, I can't thank you enough for all your hard work for this Board. I wish you luck and hopefully you'll allow me to come sit on your bench, since you never allowed me in your office!

Freeholder Leonard said to my friend, I will never call her Riletta, I always call her Ms. Cream, who is somebody I don't know how in her ripe age of 35, always has more energy than I do. She is someone in my short tenure on this Board, who has been the Mother of this Board. She has always made sure that people know that education is a priority to her and will be a priority to this Board when we are dealing with education matters. He said she is someone that made sure that libraries

are still continuing to be important to Camden County to ensure the people have that opportunity throughout the County. He said she is someone who I found out recently is a world traveler. She has traveled around the world and I hope you continue to do that. He said she is someone who I recently got to spend some time with and has told me she has had bumps in the road but never let that get her down. I think that is important to recognize. At a young age, she lost her Mother but didn't let that deter her. She became an educator. He said something that came to mind when she was telling her stories to me before there was a Joe Clark in Patterson, there was a Riletta Cream in Camden. It is amazing the few times that I walked with her when we were going door to door as Jeff said, I too saw a young man of about 35 years old who was smoking a cigarette and I heard him say to his other friend - put that out, it's Ms. Cream. You don't want to get into trouble. It is amazing that an educator sometimes has a profound influence on people's lives and that certainly is evident in Ms. Cream. It has been a number of years since she has been at Camden High but even tonight someone says, in 1982, 1983, you were my Principal. When Ms. Cream was the Principal, you didn't mess around. He said I think we lost a little of that today and it is evident in what you see but I think we can get back to that. I hope that Ms. Cream will still stick around when she has time to help us out and still continue to mentor young people. I will miss you, but good luck and I hope we will still continue to have our conversations.

Freeholder Rodriguez thanked the Mayor and Council for their generous hospitality. She said this is always a pleasant place to be in - Somerdale is beautiful - has wonderful residents. She said we spent an hour and forty minutes in one house! She said I would also like to take the opportunity to thank our employees who are not just doing more with less but they are actually doing better with what they have. We have amazing employees throughout the County and I want to thank them for the hard work that they do all of them. She said I would like to say a special thank you to Mike Brennan and congratulations. She said I know I will definitely miss you because I know whenever there was a problem, when there was an issue whenever I was concerned about legalities, I knew I could very quickly reach out to Mike whether it was a text, an email, I would get a response right away. It was always reassuring and comforting because he knew what he was talking about. It is nice to know when you have someone with legal expertise that really knows what they are talking about and really can advise you properly. I am going to miss that. I want to thank you!

To Freeholder Cream, she said what can I say? You are like the Mother that we all love! You are the Mother that we all love. That is what you are on the Freeholder Board, you guide us, you keep us in check, make sure we always remember where we came from, where we are going. It is what we are here for; we are here to serve the people. We can enjoy what we do but there are times when things are hard and we just have to stick to it and make sure that we keep moving forward and we are here to help the people. There are so many people whose lives you touched. You were and are the role model in all their lives. As a Principal, as a teacher and as a Freeholder - you made waves - you've changed lives with quiet conviction! She said you have turned things around. Freeholder Rodriguez said that I know for a fact because I grew up in Camden City that you took Camden High from a very difficult learning environment and turned it to an incredible learning environment. She said she remembers when Ms. Cream retired. She said my friends at Camden High were devastated to see you go. She said you kept them in

check and they knew that - you were the glue - you were there. She said they needed strong people to keep them in check. They try adults, they test them but they need someone to kick them back in and set them straight - you did that. You still do that! I want to thank you for that. I want you to keep doing that! Congratulations - I know you will not go far because you love us all too much! Thank you.

Freeholder Greco said I would like to thank Somerdale for their hospitality this evening. Somerdale has always been like a second home and I feel very comfortable coming here. I can deal with the retirement of Larry King and Regis Philbin! I am really having trouble dealing with the retirement of Michael Brennan and Riletta Cream. Last Tuesday, we had a Caucus meeting. I try to get to Caucus meetings early. Ms. Cream is always there before me. He said I look down and she is doing a crossword puzzle. He said I look over her shoulder to see if I could help her but she is just zipping through the crossword puzzle - I can't help her at all. She talks about hair - I don't even have any! She is a very special person who 15 years ago invited me to be a member of the Camden County Library Commission. I spent 9 years on that Commission, this is before I was a Freeholder before I knew what Freeholders were - I knew who Riletta Cream was! She was the kind of liaison that was there making a difference, caring and making things happen. That's how we ended up with branches in Winslow and we talked back then about Camden City and now it came to fruition through her hard work. She is a very special person - a person that I love to call Freeholder but I prefer to call friend because that is the kind of person that she is. I am going to miss her although I am going to rely on her - I don't think she is going anywhere. She is much brighter than I am - much younger than I am and so much more together than I am so I think she will certainly remain an asset to the Board as someone we can always call upon.

To Michael Brennan, Freeholder Greco said I am having a phone installed on that bench! He said Michael has always been there for us. He is the blender, the person who makes things happen with Corrections, Public Safety, which are my departments. He said you can call him with issues and he always has a correct response. Freeholder Greco said I wish both of you the best of luck in your future and enjoy a wonderful retirement.

Deputy Director McDonnell said to Mike Brennan, I can just say good luck and maybe I'll see you around!! To Riletta, I was going to mail a letter to you but in the interest of time, I am just going to read it very quickly and then give it to you. The Deputy Director read the letter as follows:

"Dear Riletta,

On behalf of every citizen of Camden County, I congratulate you on an accomplishment-studded career which must be the envy of all who value public service. As a teacher, principal, student teacher, supervisor, guardian of County libraries and friend to all in need, you have touched the lives of thousands, many of whom are no doubt unaware that it was you, who made their lives better. Like a stone tossed into the water, the soft ripples of your life have drifted to places you cannot know and touched lives you will never see. Any of us on this Board and in this entire room tonight will justifiably beam with pride if at the end of our careers we can say that we

achieved even one percent of what you have contributed to Camden County and to the world. For allowing each of us to be your partners in this special episode of your life, we say thank you. You have enriched this Board with your many gifts and with your grace and dignity, you have elevated our lives.
